

#### **Air Quality Alert for Santa Barbara County**

SANTA BARBARA COUNTY, Calif. — The Santa Barbara County Public Health Department and the Santa Barbara County Air Pollution Control District (APCD) have upgraded the Air Quality Watch to an Alert for Santa Barbara County, including the Channel Islands. Smoke and ash from the <u>Alisal</u> Fire is affecting air quality, and winds in the forecast are expected to push more smoke onshore. This is a dynamic situation,





APCD collects particulate matter (PM) data countywide from permanent monitors:

> ▶ PM 2.5: Santa Maria, Santa Barbara, Lompoc, Santa Ynez, Goleta, and Carpinteria (coming soon)

▶ PM 10: Santa Maria, Santa Barbara, Lompoc, Goleta, and Las Flores Canyon

We also have installed 40+ PurpleAir sensors throughout the county

PM 2.5 (smoke) and PM 10 (ash) are the pollutants of concern with wildfires





### Wildfire Smoke & Health

- Smoke and ash contain particulate matter (PM)
- PM harms the lungs and heart
- Sensitive groups are especially vulnerable to health effects
  - Sensitive groups: Kids, seniors, pregnant women, people with heart and/or lung conditions






### **Air Quality Alerts**

- Goal is to issue Alerts before air quality becomes Unhealthy
- Alerts are issued with County Public Health
- Smoke from wildfires hundreds of miles away can also travel to Santa Barbara County
- Alerts are issued in English and Spanish
- During smoke events, it's important to pay attention to dynamic current conditions as well as the daily forecasts







# Health-Protective Actions

- ► The best protection against wildfire smoke is to stay indoors as much as you can
  - Buy or make a HEPA device to create a "clean air room" at home: www.OurAir.org/clean-air-rooms
  - Keep windows and doors closed and wellsealed
  - Don't exercise outdoors
- Check air quality readings to see when conditions improve
  - ► AQI chart
  - Eyes and nose
- N-95 masks are a great tool for people who must work outside





### **Outreach Tools**

- Sharing information about "clean air rooms"
  - Infographics and new videos
  - Clean Air Centers
- Working with partners to encourage people to sign up for Air Quality Alerts - via text & email
  - ► Ag Commissioner's Office
  - County OEM
  - ► CARB
- Activity chart for schools
- Can provide bilingual content for newsletters, social media, etc.
