# SLO Co APCD and CAL FIRE Joint Residential Burn Permit Program

### BACKGROUND

### Legislation passed in 2018 intended to improve forest resiliency and reduce wildfire impacts

#### Senate Bill (SB) 901

- ► Included \$1 Billion for healthy forests and fire prevention (\$200 Million/yr over 5 years)
  - ▶ \$165 million went to the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL FIRE) for healthy forest and fire prevention programs and projects to improve forest health and reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions from uncontrolled wildfires.
  - ▶ \$35 million went to CAL FIRE to complete prescribed fire and other fuel reduction projects through proven forestry practices consistent with the recommendation of the State's Forest Carbon Plan



### BACKGROUND

- ► In the 2023-2024 burn season CAL FIRE implemented a new requirement for all burners within their State Responsibility Areas (SRAs) or other areas of CAL FIRE Authority to have a permit
  - ► This is part of the state-wide effort to address wildfire risk and understand how much fuel is being reduced through burning
  - Previously only the APCD had been issuing Residential Burn Permits within SLO County- not the same in all areas of the state
  - Huge effort on the part of CAL FIRE in all SRA areas, which all have had different policies (could vary from station to station)





### BACKGROUND

#### Implementation had many challenges

- Every region is different- relied on local CAL FIRE to administer and answer questions
- Burning is not allowed in some areas, so how can burners be prevented from obtaining permits in prohibited areas?
- Confusion on part of burners- now they are required to have two permits for same location in SLO County
- Enforcement is difficult- How do you address folks who get free online CAL FIRE permit, but fail to obtain the required APCD Burn Permits?
- Terminology/Definitions are different- Some "Ag" burners under APCD definitions are considered residential (LE- 62A permit) burners by CAL FIRE

### HOW DO WE MAKE IT BETTER?

## 2023-2024 was a challenging burn season for SLO Co APCD

- The District fielded a large volume of questions from burners since most were already familiar with APCD burn program
- > CAL FIRE did not have extensive outreach to burners
- CAL FIRE Permits were only available online no provision for paper permits
- Burners in areas not eligible for burning were able to get permits in some cases
- Some burners did not want to get APCD permit and only obtained free CAL FIRE Permit



### HOW DO WE MAKE IT BETTER?

### Utilized resources and connections through the CAPCOA Prescribed Fire Working Group


- Worked with CAPCOA to provide GIS data of areas where burning is prohibited in SLO County- CAL FIRE system should have not allowed permit issuance in those areas
- Made connection to State CAL FIRE stakeholders to understand how we might be able to work together
- Began a dialogue to understand what might be possible with the resources we have available



## Uses existing APCD Office Information System (OIS) with upgrades


- APCD Administration Staff and IT worked directly with CAL FIRE Staff Chief in Sacramento and CAL FIRE GIS team to develop solution
  - Identified needs from both sides
  - > Looked at existing systems to see if they could be utilized to minimize cost
  - Developed policy for permits where there was not direct alignment for burn type between APCD and CAL FIRE - AG-1 permits for example
  - Still ironing out details related to calendars burn season timelines not in alignment between CAL FIRE and APCD





- Uses existing OIS format for data entry
- Creates an option to CAL FIRE Sync
- Identifies Ticket
   Number (permit)
   in format CAL
   FIRE needs
- Will create both APCD and CAL FIRE permits for APCD BYB and AG1 burns (CAL FIRE LE-62A)





- Creates data table with all permit information
- Communicateswith CAL FIRE database
- Compares data with data entered into OIS
- Identifies new permits and related information
- Updates new permit data to CAL Fire System



- ► Impacts the majority portion of burn permits issued in SLO County
  - Last year issued 1,631 burn permits total
    - 1053 residential
    - ▶ 541 Ag (Approx. 350 <10 tons)
    - ▶ 37 special permits
  - Approximately 1,400 of those permits qualify as CAL FIRE LE-62A permits
  - Approximately 85% of all burn permits will be streamlined by this process
